

Definition

Florida Statute 787.06 (2)(d) defines Human Trafficking as:

- transporting,
- soliciting,
- recruiting,
- harboring,
- providing,
- enticing,
- maintaining,
- or obtaining another person for the purpose of exploitation of that person.

Sex Trafficking vs. Labor Trafficking

Sex Trafficking

- Individuals are forced to perform commercial sex acts through the use of force, fraud, or coercion.
- Commercial sex involving persons under 18 does not need to have force, fraud, coercion to be considered sex trafficking.
- Includes prostitution, pornography, and the exchange of sex acts through anything of value.
- Most victims are between the ages of 14-16 when introduced into sex trafficking.
- Massage parlors can operate as a front for sex trafficking.

Labor Trafficking

- Individuals are forced to perform tasks through the use of force, fraud, or coercion.
- Labor trafficking does not involve commercial sex acts.
- Includes debt bondage, forced labor, and involuntary child labor.
- Common type of labor trafficking victims include: farm workers, domestic servants, and factory workers.
- Can also include unsafe working conditions with little or no pay for work.

THE MEANS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Force: Physical restraint, physical harm, sexual assault, and physical beatings as a means to control victims. Also, includes the confinement and monitoring of victims to breakdown victim's resistance towards abuse. Often happens during the early stages of trafficking.

Fraud: False promises regarding work conditions, pay, love, relationship status, or even for a better life. There is no intent by the trafficker to fulfill any of these obligations.

Coercion: Threats of harm against the victim, the use of physical restraint, or psychological manipulation to control victim. Also includes, the confiscation of identification or the threat of releasing sensitive information about the victim.

Coercion 787.06(2)(a)

- 1. Using or threatening to use physical force against any person;
- 2. <u>Restraining, isolating, or confining or threatening to restrain, isolate, or confine any person without lawful authority and against her or his will;</u>
- 3. <u>Using lending or other credit methods to establish a debt</u> by any person when labor or services are pledged as a security for the debt, if the value of the labor or services as reasonably assessed is not applied toward the liquidation of the debt, the length and nature of the labor or services are not respectively limited and defined;
- 4. <u>Destroying, concealing, removing, confiscating, withholding, or possessing</u> any actual or purported <u>passport, visa</u>, or <u>other immigration document</u>, or any other actual or purported <u>government identification document</u>, of any person;
- 5. Causing or threatening to cause <u>financial harm</u> to any person;
- 6. Enticing or luring any person by fraud or deceit; or
- 7. <u>Providing a controlled substance</u> as outlined in Schedule [I] [II] of Florida Statute 893.03 to any person for the purpose of [exploitation of that person] or [using coercion for commercial sexual activity].

Can you think of examples?

Examples of Coercion

- Beating, pushing, shoving using prior beatings as motivation (threats)
- Taking and leaving a girl in a hotel located a far walk from any place to get sustenance
- Bonding out of jail, narcotics, paying for clothes, food, rooms, nails etc.
- DL's, birth certificates
- Maxing out credit cards, taking all earned money
- "Come with me, I'll take care of you"
- Want to be a model? Webcam only...
- Providing narcotics and then withholding them

Stages of Human Trafficking

Luring:

- >Assessing
- >Testing
- >Collecting Info
- >Make them feel special

Grooming & Gaming:

- >Honeymoon Stage
- >In love, dreams coming true
- >Promises of family, home
- >Treating to new clothes, hair, nails
- >May begin illicit drug use

Coercion & Manipulation:

- >Mixed messages
- >Withdrawing
- >Toys with emotions
- >She/He tries to get back in good graces
- >Sexual acts compliance is rewarded with drugs or money

Exploitation:

- >Broken down
- >Threatens safety of loved ones
- >She/He owes a debt
- >Financial pressures
- >Emotional/physical abuse
- >Confinement & Isolation







Restitution Breakdown

Rates

Time	In Call	Outcall
QV (15 min)	\$100	\$120
HH (30 min)	\$120	\$160
HR (60 min)	\$180	\$200

Dates Per Day

5-6

Average date per day: 5.5

Wages Per Day

5.5 dates x \$146.67 rate = \$806.69



Restitution Continued

Days of Labor

Time period

June 3, 2020- November 9, 2020 (23 weeks- 159 days)

December 10, 2020- January 7, 2021 (4 weeks- 28 days)

Total weeks: 27 weeks

Average days of labor: 4 days per week

Wages Per Week

4 x \$806.69 = \$3,226.74 per week


Total Restitution

\$3,226.74 per week x 27 weeks = \$87,121.98







IF IT'S SO BAD WHY DON'T THEY JUST LEAVE?

THE SIGNS OF TRAFFICKING

CAN'T GET THEIR STORY STRAIGHT

- Can't clarify where they're staying
- Lacks knowledge of whereabouts.
- No sense of time.
- Rehearsed or inconsistent story.
- Lying about age.
- Unexplained expensive gifts.

POOR HEALTH OR BEHAVIOR

- Fearful, anxious or depressed, especially around law enforcement.
- Avoids eye contact.
- Poor physical health or malnutrition.
- Signs of physical or sexual abuse.

SHOWS A LACK OF CONTROL

- Few or no personal belongings.
- Not in control of their money or ID.
- Not allowed to speak for themselves.
- In presence of older boyfriend / girlfriend.
- Minor in company of controlling individual.

TRAFFICKERS BRAND WOMEN TO CLAIM OWNERSHIP



BRANDING – 787.06 4(b) - Any person who permanently brands, or directs to be branded, victim of an offense under this section commits a second degree felony.



BECAUSE OF THIS CONTROL, HOW CAN WE BEST UNDERSTAND & SERVE SURVIVORS?

victims don't self-identify

Remember

- No two H.T. victims will have had the same experience-EMPATHIZE
- Do NOT judge
- Do NOT challenge or question the veracity of the victim You will alienate or re-traumatize the victim
- Be mindful that your victim may NEVER be able to testify
- Eye to eye (do not hover)
- Do NOT make promises you can't keep
- Be aware of cultural differences eye contact; hand shaking; It may not be what you think

Approach the Victim this Way:

- EMPATHIZE-Acknowledge their trauma/pain/situation
- What are you able to tell me about your experience?
- Tell me more about...?
- Help me understand...?
- Tell me about your thought process during...?
- Ask about sensory details
- Tell me about the most difficult part?
- What can't you forget?

Triggers of Re-Traumatization

In order to avoid re-traumatizing the victim, we must understand the physical, social and emotional impact cooperation will have on the victim and must avoid triggers such as:

- Lack of Control
- Unexpected Changes or Circumstances
- Feeling threatened or attacked
- Feeling vulnerable or frightened
- Feeling shame

OUTREACH

Providing Survivor Services Outside of the Residential Program

- Services include: victim advocacy, case management, and trauma resolution therapy
- Sex Trade Support Group and educational classes
- On the Streets and in the Jails
- Turn Your Life Around (T.Y.L.A.)
 - Prostitution Court Diversion Program

OVC (OFFICE FOR VICTIMS OF CRIME)


- Serves labor and sex trafficking survivors by providing comprehensive case management, assistance with documentation, therapy, victim advocacy, and more.
- Tampa Bay Human Trafficking Task Force
 - Eight counties in Florida: Sarasota, Pasco, Hillsborough,
 Pinellas, Manatee, Hernando, Hardee, and Polk.

TYLA Court

"After a few years [of partnering with Selah Freedom], prostitution dropped by 40% and is down 90% as of 2019," Deputy Chief Pat Robinson, Sarasota Police Department.

- Turn Your Life Around (TYLA) Court is a treatment court
- O Goal is rehabilitation, not punishment
- TYLA Court recognizes that some charges are a symptom of trauma
- Historically, TYLA was a prostitution diversionary program comprised of Selah Freedom, Sarasota Police Department, First Step (detox), and State Attorney's Office of the 12th Judicial Circuit of Florida
- Branched out to Manatee County and to include charges other than only prostitution

Briefing with Treatment Team



Conclusion

Opt out of TYLA before plea

Face charges on criminal line for sentencing

Dismissal

Cases sentenced by TYLA Judge if pled into TYLA

Graduation Options

- Charges administratively dismissed
- Adjudication withheld
- Termination of probation (if applicable)

TOP 3 OUTREACH/OVC VICTORIES


IN 2023


IN 2024
